Media/Public Relations: Several members of the COD Committee attended and were impressed by a recent presentation by Justice Sanctions of La Crosse. Justice Sanctions has a media outreach plan that involves both television and newspaper, with specific justice topics slated to be discussed on consecutive days in March. Justin Green suggests that we borrow from this concept and formulate our own media plan, perhaps pairing an opinion piece (authored by a CJCC representative) along with a corresponding news article. Suggested topics might include the following: Overview by Judge Challeen, CJCC History & Activity, Crime Prevention, CARE, Court Changes, County Attorney Perspectives and Future Projects. The proposed timeline for this project would be six weeks to two months from start to finish. Kalene indicated that she and Sally would be making a presentation to the County Board on Tuesday, February 22nd. The presentation will include information about the history and structure of the CJCC, its accomplishments and its future direction, with an emphasis on prevention. She felt it would be important to emphasize the shift away from the “lock-em-up and throw away the key mentality” to the evidence-based practices that endorse rehabilitation and prevention. Others felt that the focus should not exclusively be on either one newspaper, or even just newspapers in general, but should encompass other forms of media such as television and radio. Having support from multiple areas of the justice system would also be crucial—like in the case of having law enforcement support for a diversion program. The goals of a media effort could be to educate others and gain support (1) for the CJCC, (2) for the concept of “prevention” models of corrections and (3) for funding of future projects of the CJCC. Kevin, Sally, Kalene and Karin expressed an interest in serving on a workgroup headed by Justin to coordinate a media plan. Kalene will arrange a meeting of the workgroup sometime after the Tuesday board meeting.

Township Officer’s Meeting: Due to a change in the meeting start time, the CJCC contingent arrived after the meeting was over. They were able to meet with people one-on-one and will request to be put on the April 13 agenda.

Human Rights Commission: The Human Rights Commission will be manning a table at Earth Day on April 16th and it would be great to have someone from CJCC at the booth to talk about the expansion of the Commission to a county-wide commission. The Human Rights Workgroup will meet on February 24, 2011 at 8:00 a.m. in Karin’s office to determine the next steps in making that goal a reality.

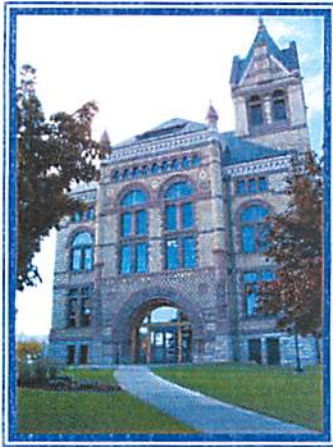
Committee Leadership: Kevin will be the committee chair.

Approval of Minutes from February 16, 2011 Meeting: Approved by consensus.

Government Day:

- **Scenario:** The scenario that will be played out during Government Day sessions is the theft of an iPod at school. Justin W. will provide a summary of the scenario for use in the booklet and will also script out the trial (which will be acted out by the students). Kevin will talk to the teachers about which student, in each group, would be suitable for playing the role of defendant. Following the meeting, Justin W. provided the following summary of the scenario:

A local middle school student opened her locker and realized that her iPod had gone missing. The student spoke with some of her friends and began to suspect that another student, Dennis the Menace, had taken the iPod out of her locker and sold it for cash. The student reported the missing iPod to her teacher. Dennis the Menace was charged with Theft and Receiving Stolen Property and he is scheduled for trial. Several witnesses are expected to testify. After listening to all of the testimony and reviewing all of the evidence, it will be up to a jury to determine whether Dennis the Menace is guilty of Theft and Receiving Stolen Property.

- **Volunteers:** Lynn Theurer has secured commitments from several League of Women Voters to volunteer as tour guides on May 2nd, including Karen Fawcett (part of the day), Lori Ortega, Deb White, Kay Shaw and Lynn Theurer. Kevin O’Laughlin from the County Attorney’s Office has also agreed to volunteer. Lynn will try to get additional volunteers so there are two LWV volunteers for each group. Because Lynn will be gone from 4/19 to 5/1, she will e-mail contact information for all volunteers to Kalene and direct them to contact Kalene with questions.
- **In-School Session:** The Winona Middle School has suggested *April 28th from 2-3 p.m. for the in-school assembly portion of Government Day. At this session, members of the County Board would be present to talk about the role of the County Board and also to deliberate (and pass) a “fake” ordinance regarding theft. Kevin Kearney would be present to talk about the role of law enforcement and to perform the arrest of the suspect. Mena will check with County Board members regarding their availability for the date. *Note: following the meeting, the WMS suggested Friday, April 29th from 2-3 p.m. for the assembly portion.

- **On-Site Portion:** The on-site portion of Government Day will consist of six different stations, each of which is allotted 20 minutes in length, inclusive of travel time between stations. The morning session will run from 9:15 a.m. to 11:15 a.m. and the afternoon session will run from noon til 2:00 p.m. There will be four groups of 35 students shuttling between stations. Two of the groups will convene for each trial (total of 70 students for each trial), but the groups will otherwise travel in groups of 35 to the remaining five stations. Following are the stations, locations and the volunteers at each station:

Each station volunteer should prepare and provide to Kalene a bullet point of talking points to include:

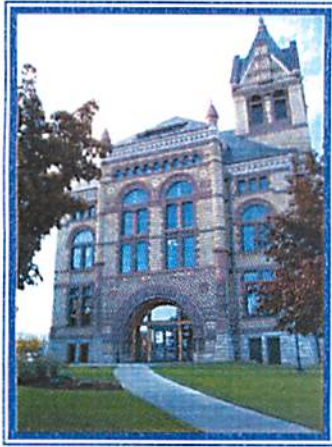
- Who you are and what you do
- What are the responsibilities of your office/department and how does it fit into the justice system
- Any interesting information you plan to tell the kids (like how many officers work for the Winona PD or how many inmates there are on average in jail or how many cases are filed each day)
- A demonstration of what you or your office would actually do given the hypothetical situation
- A description of whatever else you are going to do to fill the time allotted (perhaps a tour of the facility)
- **Other Government Day Responsibilities:**
 - **Transportation:** Kevin will confirm that the buses are still on reserve.
 - **Media:** All agreed that media needs to be contacted.
 - **Other schools:** Fatima and Nicole obtained information on private schools in Winona. Based upon the number Nicole obtained, we would have room to invite private schools to the 2nd event (tentatively planned for September). Nicole will work on getting information on charter schools. To reach home schooled children, we will use the media.

CJCC, Diversion and the Media: Following the recent article on CJCC successes in the Post, Sarah Elmquist expressed an interest in doing more in-depth articles on some of the CJCC programs. Justin G. agreed to coordinate this with Sarah. Karin also soon plans to submit a guest column to the Winona Daily News to clarify that the diversion program was a collaborative effort, not simply the effort of the County Attorney's Office

Human Rights Commission: Following the February 24, 2011 workgroup meeting, Karin was going to follow-up with Roseann Shaw of the City Attorney's Office regarding the proposed agreement that had been circulated between the former City and County Attorney. Kalene will try to locate any correspondence she has on the issue and forward it to Karin.

Law Day:

- **Synthetic Drugs:** Synthetic drugs have become an ever-increasing problem in Winona County. Committee members expressed an interest in doing more on this issue. Suggestions included incorporating public health into the presentation, involving local PTAs, appealing to the legislators, passing a local city ordinance and educating people within the system. It seems like “plant food” is more of an issue in Winona than it is in the rest of the state. Carmaine will talk to Todd Hoff to see if he could attend the May 4th CJCC meeting. Kevin will invite Margaret Schild and Kalene will invite the press and legislators. Since the Crime Prevention Committee is also interested in working on the issue, perhaps a joint committee could be formed.

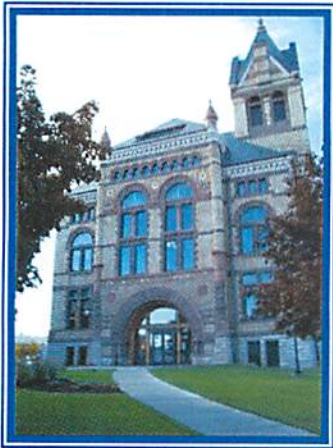

Law Day Wrap-Up: Law Day was a success. We did receive good feedback from volunteers, students and teachers and will need to tweak a few things for the next Law Day. One change will be to have a roadmap of events poster at each location, notifying participants where they are in the process. Another would potentially be a scavenger hunt-like activity to keep the children more engaged. To accommodate multiple schools, we may need to videotape a mock County Board meeting and then have Kevin Kearney present the video, as well as discuss the role of law enforcement, during on-site visits to the various schools. We will discuss and implement these changes in time for the next Law Day in late September/early October of 2011. 'We have a crisis on our hands'

CIVICS LESSON

• Knowledge about the Bill of Rights, Congress and how the branches of government work stumped many students tested nationwide.

Fewer than half of U.S. eighth-graders knew the purpose of the Bill of Rights on the most recent national civics examination, and only one in 10 demonstrated acceptable knowledge of the checks and balances among the legislative, executive and judicial branches, according to test results released on Wednesday.

At the same time, three-quarters of high school seniors who took the test, the National Assessment of Educational Progress, were unable to demonstrate civic skills like identifying the effect of United States foreign policy on other nations or naming a power granted to Congress by the Constitution.

27,000 students tested

"Today's NAEP results confirm that we have a crisis on our hands when it comes to civics education," said former Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, who last year founded icivics.org, a nonprofit group that teaches students civics through Web-based games and other tools.

The Department of Education administered the tests, known as

the nation's report card, to 27,000 fourth-, eighth- and 12th-grade students last year. Questions cover themes including how government is financed, what rights are protected by the Constitution and how laws are passed.

Average fourth-grade scores on the test's 300-point scale rose slightly since the exam was last administered, in 2006, to 157 from 154. Average eighth-grade scores were virtually unchanged at 151. The scores of high school seniors — students who are either eligible to vote or about to be — dropped to 148 from 151. Those scores mean that about a quarter of 4th- and 12th-grade students and about one-fifth of eighth-graders ranked at the proficient or advanced levels.

"The results confirm an alarming and continuing trend that civics in America is in decline," said Charles Quigley, executive director of the Center for Civic Education, a nonprofit based in California. "During the past decade or so, educational policy and practice appear to have focused more and more upon developing the worker at the expense of developing the citizen."

One bright spot in the results was that Hispanic students, who

make up a growing proportion of the nation's population and student body, narrowed the gap between their scores and those of non-Hispanic white students. On average, Hispanic eighth-graders scored 137 and non-Hispanic whites 160. That 23-point gap was down from 29 points in 2006. Among high school seniors, the gap narrowed to 19 points from 24 in 2006.

The black-white achievement gap, which is about 25 points at the fourth- and eighth-grade levels and 29 points among seniors, did not change significantly.

At the bottom

The results showed that a smaller proportion of fourth- and eighth-graders demonstrated proficiency in civics than in any other subject the federal government has tested since 2005, except history, U.S. students' worst subject.

"We face difficult challenges at home and abroad," O'Connor said. "Meanwhile divisive rhetoric and a culture of sound bites threaten to drown out rational dialogue and debate. We cannot afford to continue to neglect the preparation of future generations for active and informed citizenship."

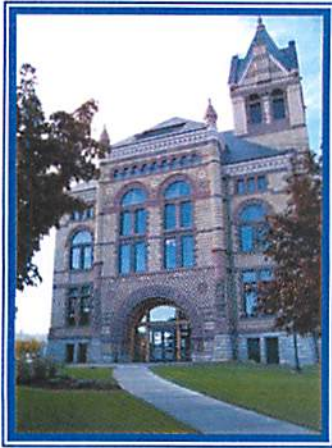

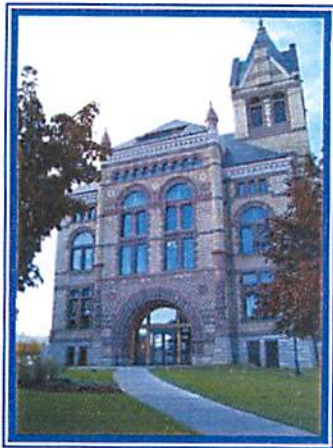
Outreach Events:

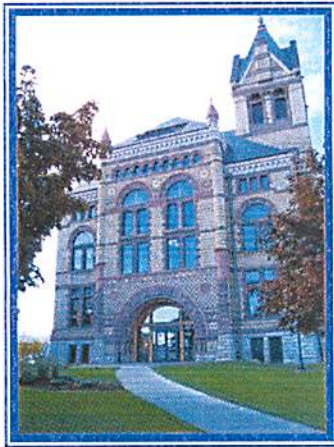
Project FINE Speaker's Bureau: Project FINE has pulled together a group of speakers willing to speak about Project FINE and its work.

Bullying: This agenda item was a referral from the Juvenile Justice Committee, whose members noted that bullying was a big problem in area schools. COD Committee members concurred that it was a growing problem. After much discussion, the committee decided on two courses of action. First, the committee will monitor and assist in the work currently being done by Lori Ortega (president of the Winona Schools PTA), who is organizing a project called Rachel's Challenge.¹ There is a presentation scheduled for January 31st at the Winona Senior High School Auditorium. Karin will obtain more information on the project and circulate it to the group. Second, Carmaine's intern will assemble information/videos/materials on existing bullying programs for the group to review and consider.

Scams: Kevin has almost completed the Scams Brochure. Distributing the brochure via the Winona Post would be cost prohibitive. HBC has agreed to post the brochure on its website and make brochures available in the HBC Office. Kalene will have her staff check with Charter to see if it would be willing to do the same.

CJCC Appreciation Luncheon: The Appreciation Luncheon was a success. Members donated approximately \$70 and several bags of groceries to Volunteer Services. If funding would allow, COD would support making this an annual event.

Drug Drop Box(es): Kevin included this agenda item to raise awareness of the fact that drug drop boxes are available for people to use to deposit their outdated/unused prescription drugs, as well as illegal drugs. One box is located in the Law Enforcement Center and is maintained by the Sheriff and Environmental Services. The Committee discussed additional ways to raise awareness of the fact that drugs should be disposed of properly to avoid illegal use as well as environmental concerns.

Crime Stoppers: Kevin reported that the Crime Stoppers Board is looking at different ideas to get people more interested in Crime Stoppers and reporting crimes. One area being explored is featuring unsolved crimes, possibly on a website.

Other:

- **Immigration Law Event:** Project FINE received a small grant from the Minnesota State Bar Association to host a "Law Day" with attorneys from the Immigration Law Center in St. Paul. The event will be held in St. Charles on February 28, 2012 and will consist of a short presentation, followed by individual meetings by attorneys with participants.
- **Winona Co. Sexual and Domestic Violence Primary Prevention Project:** The 2012 Action Plan will be finalized and available in January.
