### **The Winona County Experience**

An overview of efforts taken in Winona County to identify, develop and implement strategies to improve response to individuals with mental illness who are involved in the justice system.

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### The Winona County Experience Creation of a CJCC

- ▶ 2001 County requested technical assistance (TA) from National Institute of Corrections Jails Division to evaluate need for a new jail due to jail overcrowding. Experts recommend, among other things, the formation of a CJCC.
- ▶ 2007- County requested TA to form a CJCC. TA providers conducted interviews of key stakeholders and held a formation session in May of 2007.
- ▶ June 5, 2007- County Board establishes by resolution and funds the Winona County Criminal Justice Coordinating Council.
- March 1, 2008 First (and only) Executive Director hired.



### The Winona County Experience What is a CJCC?



A criminal justice coordinating council (CJCC) is the general term used to describe a body of elected and senior justice system leaders that convene on a regular basis to coordinate systemic responses to justice problems. CJCCs differ widely in the membership and structure. However, generally speaking, a CJCC is a partnership of decision makers who have a stake in the effective administration of justice.

## The Winona County Experience Early Efforts



### CARE (Community Assessment and Reintegration) Program (2009-2019)



Jail re-entry program designed to address the needs of the returning offender to help them successfully integrate into the community and reduce recidivism

### Treatment Court of Winona County (2012 to present)

Post adjudication treatment court offering intense accountability and support through probation supervision, chemical dependency treatment, mental health therapy, regular court appearances and more.







The Stepping Up Initiative is a national initiative to reduce the number of people with mental illnesses in jails. It is a data-driven framework that assists counties through training, resources and support that are tailored to local needs.

- Formally joined June 2015 via County Board resolution
- Over course of 18 months, multidisciplinary task force researched, gathered data, evaluated processes and completed sequential intercept map
- Submitted application for a \$250,000 Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Grant from Bureau of Justice Assistance; received Oct. 2016; created 1<sup>st</sup> Winona County Reentry Assistance Program

### The Winona County Experience 1st Sequential Intercept Map-2016


What is SIM Mapping?: SIM Mapping is a process that results in the development of a map that illustrates how people with mental and substance use disorders enter and move through the criminal justice system. Through the process, facilitators and participants identify opportunities for linkage to treatment and other support services, and for prevention of further penetration into the criminal justice system.


Why do SIM Mapping?: SIM Mapping has three primary objectives:


- 1. The development of a comprehensive picture of how people with mental and substance use disorders enter and move through the criminal justice system along six distinct intercept points.
- 2. Identification of resources, gaps in services, and opportunities at each intercept for individuals in the target population.
- 3. The development of priorities for change and strategic action plans.

# The Winona County Experience Winona County Reentry Assistance Program 2018-2020

- Added Jail Intake Worker (now a county employee)
  - Performed bail evaluations; provided referrals to community resources; assisted w/applications, assembled paperwork, compiled data, did case management
- Added screening for mental illness and chemical dependency at jail intake
- Eligible participants served by a case manager from different disciplines (probation, child protection, treatment court, etc)
- ▶ Funding for "recovery support services" such as rent, healthcare, bus passes, education
- Crisis Intervention Training
- Secure Video Teleconferencing (even before COVID!)







### The Winona County Experience 2020-present

Partnered with Hiawatha Valley Mental Health Center; applied for and received a second Bureau of Justice Assistance <u>Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Grant</u> in the amount of \$724,674 to create an enhanced re-entry program called



WRAP+ FORMS

The Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program (JMHCP) supports cross-system collaboration to improve public safety responses and outcomes for individuals with mental illnesses (MI) or co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse (CMISA) who come into contact with the justice system.

Goal 2: Enhance in-jail mental health and chemical dependency services






- Embed social worker in jail: Full-time grant-funded social worker employed by Winona County to provide in-jail counseling/mental health services to any inmate needing those services, making referrals for in-jail CD and cog skills classes, pre-petition screening as needed (for civil commitment) and assisting with linkages to insurance and other recovery support services.
- Chemical Dependency & Mental Health Services
  - Cognitive behavioral skills class, chemical dependency services
  - In-jail psychiatric and medical health services will continue to be provided by jail medical provider

**Goal 3: Enhanced Reentry Program** 





- WRAP+ has expanded eligibility criteria and does not require an individual to have been incarcerated in order to access services (more people will qualify).
- Risk, mental health and **chemical dependency screens** are performed at the jail or upon referral to the program.
- Qualified individuals are paired with the **jail social worker** or a **community connector** (community health worker) who is part of the Winona Community Hub and employed by HVMHC) or **treatment court coordinator** to work with the participant to identify areas of needed services and to assist the individual in accessing services.
- Funding is available through the grant to assist with recovery support services, such as rent, transportation, medical and prescription expenses (until health insurance is in place), and related expenses.





	Intercept 1: Law Enforcement (911 & Emergency Services)
existing Programs	<ul> <li>County law enforcement units: Winona Sheriff's Office, Minnesota State Patrol; police departments: Winona, Goodview, Lewiston, St. Charles         <ul> <li>Law enforcement officers uphold Good Samaritan Laws which encourage calls for drug overdose and EMS (Emergency Medical Service) carry and will administer Naloxone to rapidly reverse opioid overdose.</li> <li>Training: some dispatch and Winona County officers have received Crisis Intervention Trainings; and many attend one-day menta health trainings annually. Gaps/Challenges	City of Winona is implementing a co-responder Alternative Response Team but it is not yet in place  Knowledge/identification/communication of mental health (and SUD) by dispatch to responding officers/crisis response team  Mental health history may be unknown/inaccessible, so responding officers may not be aware of history  LETG is not consistently being used to denote MH or other issues; Smart 911 information depends upon client input  Dispatchers are trained to take information and get law enforcement out to the scene and not try to determine whether it is a mental health situation (because that could present a huge liability issue). Officers on the scene make those determinations  Additional mental health and substance use training for law enforcement, and the involvement of people with lived experience in providing the training  Staffing shortages and schedules makes it difficult to provide trainings; overtime work/pay sometimes needed for training Other mandatory law enforcement required trainings make it difficult to require officers to attend non-mandatory trainings.  Implementation of the Alternative Response Team will be time and labor-intensive, but there is much information available on the topic.  No known formal police-based diversion programs other than officer discretion
Possible Action Steps	<ul> <li>Need to gather additional information on officer discretion in issuing citation, as that was included in the SIM Map Report.         <ul> <li>Explore police-based diversion programs (to reduce citations/arrests)</li> </ul> </li> <li>Continue WRAP+ Trainings; promote trainings among law enforcement</li> <li>Convene team of law enforcement heads to discuss a possible countywide training program for officers mental health and substance use.         <ul> <li>Possible use of American Rescue Plan funding to provided funding for overtime costs associated with mental health and substance use trainings</li> </ul> </li> <li>Support implementation of Alternative Response Team through research, service on implementation committees, etc.</li> </ul>



## The Winona County Experience SIM Map Workgroups-2022

#### **Early Intervention & Prevention Committee:**

- Access to Health & Human Services: Develop strategies to improve consumer access to county health and human services programs and services.
- ☐ <u>Navigator Network:</u> Create a "Navigator Network" to connect persons who help others navigate systems and access services so they can share resources and ideas.
- Resource Directory: Improve methods/ways to inform the community about available resources (i.e. resource directory/apps).

#### **Courts Committee:**

- ☐ <u>Pretrial Services:</u> Improve pretrial supervision/monitoring of release conditions.
- ☐ <u>Sentencing Orders</u>: Improve accuracy and communication regarding sentencing orders.

#### **Jail & Jail Alternatives Committee:**

- Medication Assisted Treatment: Expand local delivery of MAT (Medication Assisted Treatment).
- ☐ <u>Supportive Housing</u>: Expand local supportive housing options.



# The Winona County Experience 2023 and beyond

- ☐ We will continue to communicate regularly through our various CJCC groups to provide feedback on existing strategies making adjustments where necessary
- ☐ We will continue to address the gaps identified during the Sequential Intercept Mapping Process
- We will transition WRAP+ into new jail (opening Sept. 23) and add elements of the program that we were not able to implement due to jail construction
- We will continue WRAP+, seek a grant extension and refine and implement our strategies for sustaining the positions created by the WRAP+ Grant plus seek additional funding for non-personnel costs, such as recovery support services (i.e. rent, bus passes, etc.)
- ☐ We will continue our cross-trainings
- ☐ We will engage in another Sequential Intercept Mapping Process in approximately 2025
- ☐ We will continue to seek out additional evidence-based strategies to improve our response to individuals with mental illness who are involved in the justice system



# The Winona County Experience Possible action steps for your county

- ☐ If you do not already have a multidisciplinary group of justice system leaders and public members who meet to discuss justice system issues, consider forming one (today as a good start!)
- ☐ Take "inventory" of the existing programs and resources for mentally ill or chemically dependent individuals in your community (the first step of Sequential Intercept Mapping)
- ☐ Provide opportunities to learn about the existing programs and resources possibly by setting aside time each month for presentations or through a conference or gathering where you can learn more about resources in your community
- ☐ Consider implementing a cross-training program for criminal justice and behavioral health professionals so each discipline can learn about the other. There are many free on-line trainings
- ☐ Complete a Sequential Intercept Map to identify gaps and opportunities
