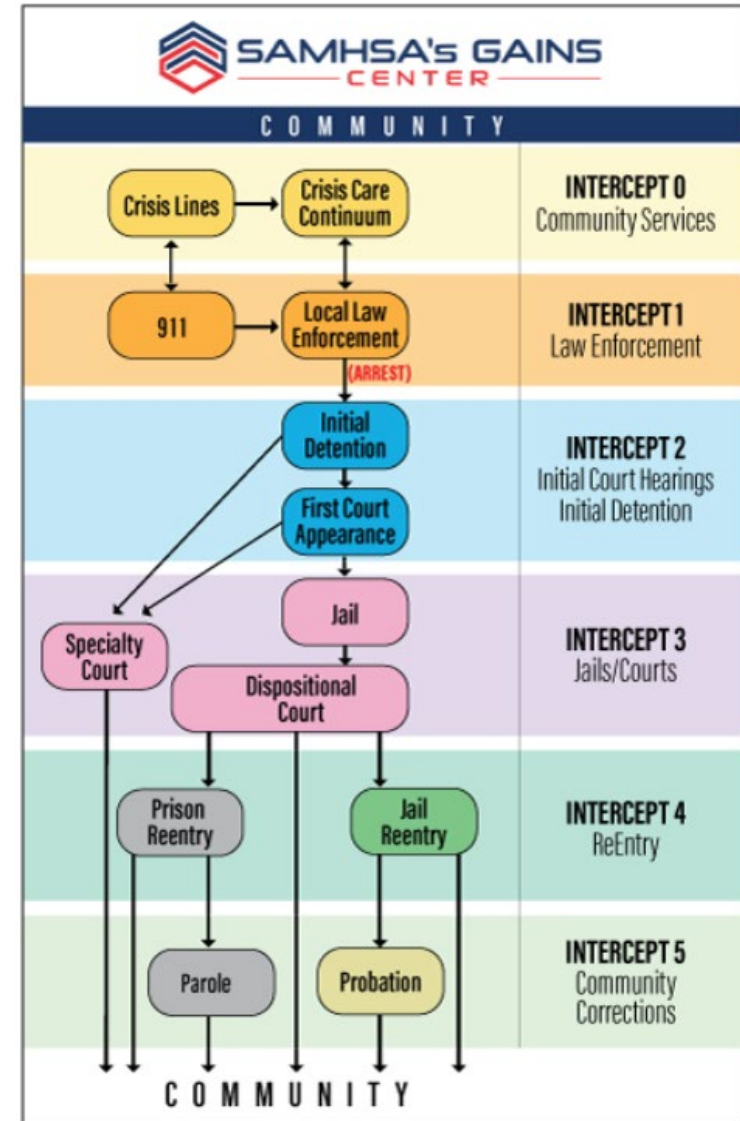

# The Sequential Intercept Model

- According to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), "The Sequential Intercept Model details how individuals with mental and substance use disorders come into contact and move through the criminal justice system."



# Intercept 0- Community Crisis Services

- Crisis Response for Southeast MN
  - 1-844-274-7472 or text HOME to 741741
  - Provides qualified counselors 24 hours a day, 365 days a year by phone.
    - Provide over-the-phone assessment, safety plans, and support.
    - Counselors help caller reach place of emotional and physical well-being.
    - Connect to local teams for additional support.



# Intercept 0 cont.

- Southeast Regional Crisis Center (SERCC)
  - 24/7 walk-in mental health facility
  - Available to all ages
  - Designed specifically for mental health crisis
  - Serves as an alternative to emergency rooms
  - Short-term residential options for those needing longer care
    - 16 beds (separate units for adults and youth)
    - 24/7 nursing and supervision, individual and group counseling, and care coordination.

# Intercept 1- Law Enforcement

- Crisis Intervention Training (CIT) for Olmsted County Sheriff's Office and Rochester Police Department law enforcement officers.
  - De-escalation and diversion to treatment resources for individuals in crisis.
- Collaborative co-responder model between law enforcement and Olmsted County Community Outreach Team
  - Team of four social workers embedded with law enforcement.
    - Further assistance with de-escalation and diversion to treatment resources including creating short-term crisis stabilization plans.
    - Follow up care coordination with individuals in the community.



# Intercept 2- Initial Detention and Hearings

- Olmsted County Adult Detention Center Booking staff administer Brief Jail Mental Health Screening to new detainee.
  - Outcome of screening may result in referral to medical and social services staff for further assessment.
- OCHHHS Forensic Behavioral Health Unit
  - Embedded mental health professional and senior social worker in the Olmsted County Adult Detention Center
    - Screening and care coordination to divert individuals with a Serious and Persistent Mental Illness, Serious Mental Illness, and/or Developmental Disability from extended incarceration.
      - Diversion efforts could include placement to group home, community-based treatment provider, crisis center, or hospitalization.



# Intercept 3- Jail and Court

- OCHHHS Forensic Behavioral Health Unit
  - Coordination with Court appointed examiners for more timely completion of Rule 20 evaluations.
    - Petitioner for Mentally Ill, Mentally Ill and Chemically Dependent, and Mentally Ill and Dangerous civil commitments stemming from Rule 20.01/20.02 findings.
  - Coordination with Olmsted County Adult Detention Center medical staff providing psychiatric prescription/prescriber information for detainees with Serious and Persistent Mental Illness.
  - Completion of diagnostic assessments and referrals to community-based mental health services for detainees with Serious and Persistent Mental Illness.
  - Referrals for completion of comprehensive substance use disorder assessments. Following completion of assessment, coordinating referrals for substance use disorder treatment to community treatment providers.



# Intercept 4- Reentry

- OCHHHS Forensic Behavioral Health Unit
  - Senior social worker embedded in the Olmsted County Adult Detention provides intensive reentry case management services to individuals with Serious and Persistent Mental Illness and Serious Mental Illness.
    - Four core components of reentry case management
      - Assessment
        - Assessing strengths, resources, supports, needs, functioning, safety, vulnerability, physical and mental health conditions.
      - Planning
        - Creation and implementation of person-centered treatment plans.
      - Referral and linkage
        - Referrals to treatment and rehabilitation services, linking with community resources and supports.
      - Monitoring and coordination
        - Identify emergence of new needs, coordinate with community providers and supports to ensure needs are being met.





# Intercept 5- Community Corrections

- OCHHHS Forensic Behavioral Health Unit
  - Social worker embedded within Dodge-Fillmore-Olmsted County Community Corrections.
    - Primarily focuses on providing intensive targeted case management services to individuals with a Serious and Persistent Mental Illness determined to be at a moderate to high risk of recidivism.
    - Core components of targeted case management with this population are also Assessment, Planning, Referral and Linkage, and Monitoring and Coordinating.
